Course Description: This course is an introduction to graduate-level topics in groups and rings.

Required Materials: *Abstract Algebra* (3rd edition) by Dummit and Foote

If you have an older edition of the textbook, please be sure to check with a friend before doing the homework, as the exercises may be different. If, for any reason, you are having difficulty obtaining the textbook, please let me know.

Homework: There will be homework assigned every Wednesday, posted on the class website, due the following Wednesday. It is fine to discuss the homework together, but you must write up your own solutions in your own words. Your solutions should be written in full sentences and be grammatically correct. Homework may be either hand-written or texed, but **if you type your homework, you must use tex.**

Exams: There will be two midterms and one final exam. The midterms will be in class on September 30 and November 18.

Grading: Your course score will be based on the following percentages:

Your letter grade will be determined according to the common 100% scale, rounded to the nearest percent:

Academic Integrity: Per university policy, students shall not plagiarize, cheat, or falsify or misuse academic records. Part II of Student Rights and Responsibilities (available online <http://www.uky.edu/StudentAffairs/Code/part2.html>) states that all academic work, written or otherwise, submitted by students to their instructors or other academic supervisors, is expected to be the result of their own thought, research, or self-expression. In cases where students feel unsure about the question of plagiarism involving their own work, they are obliged to consult their instructors on the matter before submission.

When students submit work purporting to be their own, but which in any way borrows ideas, organization, wording or anything else from another source without appropriate acknowledgment of the fact, the students are guilty of plagiarism. Plagiarism includes reproducing someone else's work, whether it be a published article, chapter of a book, a paper from a friend or some file, or something similar to this. Plagiarism also includes the practice of employing or allowing another person to alter or revise the work which a student submits as his/her own, whoever that other person may be.

Students may discuss assignments among themselves or with an instructor or tutor, but when the actual work is done, it must be done by the student, and the student alone. When a student's assignment involves research in outside sources of information, the student must carefully acknowledge exactly what, where and how he/she employed them. If the words of someone else are used, the student must put quotation marks around the passage in question and add an appropriate indication of its origin. Making simple changes while leaving the organization, content and phraseology intact is plagiaristic. However, nothing in these Rules shall apply to those ideas which are so generally and freely circulated as to be a part of the public domain (Section 6.3.1).

Please note: Any assignment you turn in may be submitted to an electronic database to check for plagiarism.
