
Write, but do not solve a linear program whose solution will produce the amounts to be invested in the Junk bonds and the Municipal bonds in order to maximize return while managing risk.



Minimize the objective function: C = 15 x + 3 y + 10 zSubject to:


 $10 \le 2x + y + 5z$  $7 \le 4x + y + z$
