1. Let $f(x) = \sqrt{x-1}$ and $g(x) = x^2$. Find the domain of the composite function $(f \circ g) = f(g(x))$.

(A) $[-1, 1]$

2. Find the equation of the line parallel to $y = 5x - 2$ passing through the point $(-1, 1)$.

$$\lim_{x \rightarrow a} \frac{x^2 + (1 - a)x - a}{x - a}.$$

4. Solve for x when $e^{4(t+x)} = 2e^{4t}$.

- (A) $x = \ln 4$
- (B) $x = \ln 2$

- (E) $x = \frac{\ln 2}{4}$

5. Simplify $\sin(\arccos(x))$. The function \arccos is also denoted by \cos^{-1} .

6. Suppose that a function f is defined by

$$f(x) = \begin{cases} x^2 - c & x \leq 1 \\ cx + 2 & x > 1. \end{cases}$$

Find c such that $\lim_{x \rightarrow 1} f(x)$ exists.

- (A) $-\frac{1}{2}$
- (B) 4
- (C) 0
- (D) -2
- (E) There is not enough information to answer this question.

7. Suppose that f is a function defined for every real number and satisfies the following properties:

$$\lim_{x \rightarrow 2} f(x) = 1, \quad f(2) = 1, \quad \lim_{x \rightarrow 3^-} f(x) = 0, \quad \lim_{x \rightarrow 3^+} f(x) = -2, \quad \text{and} \quad f(3) = 0.$$

Which of the following statements is NOT true?

- (A) f is continuous at $x = 2$
 - (B) f is left-continuous at $x = 3$
 - (C) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 3} f(x) = 0$
 - (D) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 2^+} f(x) = 1$
 - (E) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 2^+} f(x) = \lim_{x \rightarrow 2^-} f(x)$
8. Let $f(x) = e^{x^2}$. Find the slope of the secant line that passes through $(0, f(0))$ and $(2, f(2))$.
- (A) $\frac{1}{2}(e^4 - 1)$
 - (B) $1 - e^4$
 - (C) 1
 - (D) -3
 - (E) $\ln 4$

9. Find the limit

$$\lim_{x \rightarrow 0} \frac{\sin 2x}{x}.$$

- (A) 0
- (B) The limit does not exist.
- (C) 2
- (D) $\frac{1}{2}$

10. A rectangle has width w and length ℓ in meters. If the perimeter of the rectangle is fixed at 14 meters, find the function that describes the area of the rectangle as a function of w .

- (A) $7w - w^2$
- (B) $14w$
- (C) w^4
- (D) 14ℓ
- (E) $14w - 2w^2$

Free Response Questions: Show your work!

11. For each limit below, find the limit if it exists or explain why it does not exist. Carefully justify your answers.

(a) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 0} \frac{\ln(1-x)}{1+x}$

(b) $\lim_{t \rightarrow 1} \left(\frac{1}{t-1} - \frac{1}{t^2-3t+2} \right)$

(a) The function $\frac{\ln(1-x)}{1+x}$ is continuous at $x = 0$, thus, we can evaluate the limit by substituting $x = 0$ and obtain $\lim_{x \rightarrow 0} \frac{\ln(1-x)}{1+x} = 0$.

(b) We simplify the expression $\frac{1}{t-1} - \frac{1}{t^2-3t+2} = \frac{t-3}{t-2} \cdot \frac{1}{t-1}$. Next we observe that $\lim_{t \rightarrow 1} \frac{t-3}{t-2} = 2$ and $\lim_{t \rightarrow 1^{\pm}} \frac{1}{t-1} = \pm\infty$. Thus $\lim_{t \rightarrow 1^{\pm}} \frac{t-3}{t-2} \cdot \frac{1}{t-1} = \pm\infty$. Since the one-sided limits are infinite, the limit does not exist.

Free Response Questions: Show your work!

13. An object is thrown straight into the air from the surface of a distant planet. The height of the object in meters after t seconds is given by $h(t) = 4t - t^2$.
- Find the average velocity of the object over the time interval $[1.4, 1.6]$. Include units in your answer.
 - Find the average velocity of the object over the time interval $[3, 3 + k]$. Include units in your answer.
 - Compute the instantaneous velocity of the object at $t = 3$ by taking the limit as k tends to 0 of the expression found in part (b). Use limit laws to justify your answer.

<p>(a) The average velocity is $\frac{h(1.6)-h(1.4)}{1.6-1.4} = 1$ meter/second</p>	<p>Method (1 point), Answer (1 point), Units (1 point)</p>
<p>(b) The average velocity on the interval $[3, 3 + k]$ is $\frac{h(3+k)-h(3)}{k} = -2 - k$ meters/second</p>	<p>Method (2 points), Simplify (2 point), Deduct one point for missing units, unless a point was deducted for missing units in part (a).</p>
<p>(c) $\lim_{k \rightarrow 0} (-2 - k) = -2$. Since $-2 - k$ is continuous -or- using the rule for the limit of a sum and the basic limits, $\lim_{k \rightarrow 0} k = 0$ and $\lim_{k \rightarrow 0} -2 = -2$.</p>	<p>Value (2 points), justification (1 point)</p>

Free Response Questions: Show your work!

14. Let $f(x) = \frac{4x-1}{2x+3}$. Find the inverse function f^{-1} and the domain and range of f^{-1} .

<p>We solve $y = \frac{4x-1}{2x+3}$ to express x in terms of y and obtain $x = \frac{1+3y}{4-2y}$.</p> <p>Thus $f^{-1}(x) = \frac{1+3x}{4-2x}$</p> <p>Domain of f^{-1} is $\{x : x \neq 2\} = (-\infty, 2) \cup (2, \infty)$.</p> <p>Range of f^{-1} is $\{x : x \neq -3/2\} = (-\infty, -3/2) \cup (-3/2, \infty)$.</p>	<p>Set up to solve for x in terms of y (1 point)</p> <p>Correct solution for x (3 points), deduct one point for each error in algebra</p> <p>Answer (2 points)</p> <p>Domain (2 points)</p> <p>Range (2 points)</p> <p>Give credit if domain and range correspond to an incorrect answer for the inverse function.</p>
