# **MA 202 Course Content**

#### **Course Description**

Algebraic reasoning, introduction to statistics and probability, geometry, and measurement.

## **UK Department of Mathematics Professional Themes**

This course will address the four themes of the conceptual framework for the UK professional education program: **research**, **reflection**, **learning**, and **leading**. Students will engage with fundamental ideas in mathematical *research*, *reflecting* on and analyzing core mathematical content that arises throughout mathematics at all levels. Students will develop as life-long

mathematical *learners* who will be able to take active *leadership* roles in their future positions as professionals and citizens. The ultimate goal in addressing these four themes is to produce teaching leaders who work together to improve student learning among diverse populations and improve education in Kentucky and beyond.

# Unbridled Learning Initiatives and the Kentucky Core Academic Standards

This course will provide students an opportunity to advance their knowledge and mastery of the "tools" associated with Kentucky education reform, focusing on the content and practice standards outlined in the Kentucky Core Academic Standards. As students carry out projects and complete assignments that involve mathematical content underlying instructional activities for P-12 students in Kentucky schools, they will address one or more components of the Unbridled Learning initiatives.

# **Course Materials**

#### Canvas

We will use Canvas as our primary resource for this course. The important tabs to be aware of for canvas are:

- Home: Front page with navigation links to the most frequently used parts of Canvas.
- Announcements: Important instructor announcements often instructions for common questions in the course, or reminders of upcoming assignments.
- Assignments: The location of various course assignments.
- MyLab and Mastering: Contains the graded homework assignments.
- Discussions: Serves as a platform for students to ask and answer each other's questions, and is the basis of the participation grade.
- Grades: Contains all scores earned on submitted coursework.

### MyLab and Mastering

Our online homework system is MyLab and Mastering. You will need to purchase an access code (which will include an online version of the textbook) prior to gaining access to homework sets and online exams. There is a two-week free trial, so you will have at least two weeks to purchase the online course code.

#### Textbook

Our course textbook is *Mathematics for Elementary Teachers with Activities*, Sybilla Beckmann, 5th Edition. A free online version of the textbook is included in the MyLab and Mastering course mentioned above. However, hardcopies of the textbook can be bought and bundled with the access code for MyLab and Mastering, if preferred.

# **UK Rules and Regulations**

#### **Excused Absences**

If you need to request an extension on an assignment due to an excused absence, please contact your instructor as soon as possible.

It is almost always possible to notify your instructor of an excused absence before class. When students submit work purporting to be their own, but which in any way borrows ideas, organization, wording, or content from another source without appropriate acknowledgment of the fact, the students are guilty of plagiarism.

Plagiarism includes reproducing someone else's work (including, but not limited to, a published article, a book, a website, computer code, or a paper from a friend) without clear attribution. Plagiarism also includes the practice of employing or allowing another person to alter or revise the work, which a student submits as their own - whoever that other person may be. Students may discuss assignments among themselves or with an instructor or tutor, but when the actual work is done, it must be done by the student, and the student alone.

When a student's assignment involves research in outside sources or information, the student must carefully acknowledge exactly what, where, and how they have employed them. If the words of someone else are used, the student must put quotation marks around the passage in question and add an appropriate indication of its origin. Making simple changes while leaving the organization, content, and phraseology intact is plagiaristic. However, nothing in these Rules shall apply to those ideas, which are so generally and freely circulated as to be a part of the public domain.
